No two inspections are the same. The duration of the inspection depends on the home's condition as well as the home's size. You can expect the inspection to take several hours, maybe even a few days if you need additional specialists.

What happens if the inspector finds a problem?

Remember that no home is completely perfect. A home inspector may find small issues that need to be fixed like a leaky faucet or a big issue like a damaged roof.
